



MidMichigan Health is committed to higher medical education on every level with multiple Michigan university and community college partners for the goal of training future physicians and health care professionals.

MidMichigan has one of the first family medicine residency programs in the U.S., and our relationship with Michigan State University's College of Human Medicine is long-standing and successful. We have trained more than 200 family medicine physicians in this MSU-affiliated program since 1969.

MidMichigan Health recognizes MSU's excellent medical education program, and we continue to build upon our relationship with the MSU College of Human Medicine for family medicine residency education as we plan together with the college for an Alma, Michigan-based residency program to start in 2015 and ultimately reach throughout MidMichigan Health.

The Michigan State University College of Human Medicine—Midland Regional Campus was established in 2011 and 12 third- and fourth-year medical students are working toward their medical degrees with physicians throughout MidMichigan.

Additionally, learning experiences for medical students, residents and health care professionals are established throughout MidMichigan Health with Central Michigan University College of Medicine and CMU College of Health Professions, Saginaw Valley University, Alma College, Mid Michigan Community College, Delta College and many other colleges and universities throughout the region.

The advantage to students and physician residents of being associated with MidMichigan Health for medical education is that our physicians foster hands-on learning experiences and stay abreast of the most up-to-date techniques and technologies. MidMichigan providers base their practice upon the best clinical protocols and research available, and we have a collaborative learning environment without regard to university "team" alliances.

Who We Are

MidMichigan Health And The University of Michigan Health System Partner For Even Better Health Care

The partnership of MidMichigan Health and the University of Michigan Health System will help deliver more value for patients, expanding access, options, quality and level of care. It will provide our medical team deeper "bench strength" and more clinical development, and will encourage innovation and best practices. With a proven record in population health management and accountable care, UMHS will be a great partner in the new health care environment. Together MidMichigan and UMHS will improve patient health and find new ways to cooperate for better care. We will speed access to clinical specialists and treatments, and expand teamwork between our doctors, first in cancer and cardiovascular services and then in other medical specialty areas.

Even Better Heart Care

Advanced technology and approaches offered at MidMichigan now enable more effective care for the heart and vascular system. MidMichigan Regional Imaging can now perform 64-slice CT scans of the heart to evaluate arteries and assess the heart's function. Appropriate heart catheterization patients can now have a transradial procedure that accesses a blood vessel in the wrist instead of the groin for shorter recovery, less bleeding and less pain. MidMichigan Health also now provides a vascular screening clinic in the cardiology practice of MidMichigan Physicians Group, and a congestive heart failure clinic is planned to assist patients in managing their condition.

A Heart Cath Lab in Clare

A new cardiac catheterization laboratory opened at MidMichigan Medical Center—Clare in April. The new lab's technology helps cardiologists better diagnose the

severity of blockages in a heart's blood vessels and identify the best ways to treat them. Real-time digital images can be stored for physician reference.

Immediate Treatment For Trauma

A provisional trauma center is now in full operation at MidMichigan Medical Center-Midland, as we continue on course to become a verified Adult Level II Trauma Center. Around-the-clock emergency and surgical services provide local trauma care in the vital first hour of critical injury, when it is most likely to prevent death. Immediate, 24-hour access to physician specialists, including general surgeons, neurosurgeons, orthopedic surgeons and anesthesiologists, enables concurrent treatment for multiple types of injuries, such as rib fractures and collapsed lungs, internal organ injuries, fractured bones, back and spine fractures, severe wounds and lacerations, and spinal cord and head trauma.

Accreditation recognizes programs that commit to the highest level of quality breast care and undergo rigorous evaluation and performance review.

To earn accreditation, MidMichigan's Breast Health Program demonstrated proficiency in clinical management, research, community outreach, professional education, center leadership and quality improvement — evidence of a firm commitment to offer patients every significant advantage in their battle against breast disease.

Closer Is Better: Now Better Is Closer

Harrison-area residents will have easier access to primary care and specialist physician offices, laboratory services and physical therapy when MidMichigan Health Park—Harrison opens in spring 2014.

MidMichigan's partner in the new facility is the Central Michigan District Health Department. The 24,000-square-foot facility will also offer a community education room for health education programs and screenings, and a dental clinic.

Renovations at MidMichigan Health
Park—Mt. Pleasant will accommodate
additional physicians and advanced
practice providers. Expanded ancillary
service areas will include nuclear imaging
and chemotherapy services. Ancillary service
areas will be expanded and renovated to
include nuclear imaging and chemotherapy
services. Completion of the project, which
began in June 2013, is anticipated in
March 2014.

Blue Distinction+ for Spine, Knee and Hip Procedures

MidMichigan Medical Center–Midland is now designated a Blue Distinction Center+ for Spine Surgery and Knee and Hip Replacement by Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan and Blue Care Network. Facilities receiving this national designation demonstrate expertise in delivering quality specialty care, with robust quality measures for improved patient health and safety as well as new cost-efficiency measures.

The American Heart Association presented MidMichigan Medical Center–Midland the Mission: Lifeline® Receiving Center Bronze Level Recognition Award for improving STEMI systems of care. The Mission Lifeline goal is to improve treatment of patients who experience the most severe form of heart attack, called STEMI, or ST segment elevation myocardial infarction.

EMR Progress In Top 10 Percent

MidMichigan Health is in the top 10 percent of U.S. hospitals in implementing electronic medical record (EMR) technology, according to the Healthcare Information and Management Systems Society. The ranking was awarded in 2012 based on a survey of 5,071 non-federal medical/surgical hospitals. EMRs, which replace paper patient charts in hospitals and physician offices, offer patient safety advantages and help improve quality of care.

Commission on Cancer Accredits Medical Center

The Commission on Cancer of the American College of Surgeons has granted three-year accreditation with commendation to the cancer program at MidMichigan Medical Center—Midland.

Grant Supports Health Care Access


MidMichigan Medical Offices-Beaverton is now a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) under the management of MidMichigan Community Health Services, which also manages MidMichigan FQHCs in Houghton Lake and Roscommon. Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan (BCBSM) awarded MidMichigan Community Health Services \$100,000 in December 2012 in support of the organization's continued commitment to provide and expand health care access to the region's uninsured and underinsured people. The grant will help with start-up funding for MidMichigan Medical Offices—Beaverton and efforts to offer medical services to more residents in the region. The funding will also be used to recruit a physician and a case manager and to purchase equipment for the new facility.


Adding Patient-Centered Medical Homes

Twenty-two medical practices at MidMichigan Health are now Patient-Centered Medical Home practices (PCMH), as designated by Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan. In the PCMH model, primary care physicians (pediatricians, internal medicine physicians and family practice doctors) lead care teams that work with patients to keep them healthy. The practice coordinates a patient's medical care and follow-up such as specialist visits or hospitalization.

Customer service is emphasized with extended hours, same-day appointments for sick visits or urgent needs, a well-defined plan for after-hours care, electronic tools to request appointments and prescription renewals, tracking tools to proactively notify patients when they need certain tests or procedures, and easy access to services such as nutrition counseling, education or support groups.

Feeling Lucky To Be Alive After Abdominal Aneurysm

Roger Bell of St. Louis feels lucky to be alive after suffering from a life-threatening abdominal aortic aneurysm. Bell is deeply grateful for the care he received every step of the way through his ordeal. He said everyone, from the 9-1-1 operator, to the Emergency Department staff, to the surgeon who saved his life, was simply awesome. After Roger was flown by helicopter to MidMichigan Medical Center—Midland, Vascular Surgeon Omar Haqqani, M.D., used an innovative technique called endovascular stent grafting to repair his aorta.

Learning To Be Fit

The Fitness Watch Project, sponsored by MidMichigan Health in collaboration with the Great Lakes Loons and schools in Clare, Gladwin, Gratiot and Midland Counties, incentivizes activity for better physical fitness and less childhood obesity. Fourth and fifth graders work toward the U.S. Surgeon General's standard of moderate physical activity at least 60 minutes a day for five or more days, with a goal to increase the number of days and minutes of moderate intensity exercise.

Planning For Community Health

MidMichigan Health has designed and approved a plan to assess the health of the communities we serve, identify needs and respond with educational programs and services with input from community partners in Clare, Gladwin, Gratiot, Isabella and Midland Counties. The community health areas of focus are:

- Access to care including initiation and coordination of care, continuity of services and health care insurance.
- Health outcomes including heart disease, cancer and diabetes
- Health care behaviors including smoking, healthy diet, physical activity and healthy weight.
- Maternal and infant health including birth weights and breastfeeding.

Taking Healthy Steps

More than 120 area women found help and encouragement to achieve health goals at women's health conferences in Alma, Clare and Midland. Free health screenings, demonstrations and informational booths helped attendees assess their current health status, set goals and take specific actions. MidMichigan Health providers were on hand with advice and the Women's Guide to Living Well. Participants who requested follow-up calls received them a few months later to talk about their progress in making behavioral changes into healthy habits.

Canine Comfort

The Pet Therapy Service program at MidMichigan Medical Center—Gratiot welcomed 21 new canine volunteers and their handlers in the spring. They will visit patients to provide comfort during a hospital stay and greet those in the waiting area for outpatient testing. Pet therapy is also available at MidMichigan Medical Center—Midland.

Support For Cancer Caregivers

MidMichigan Health's service for families touched by cancer is expanding with a \$50,000 grant from The Hearst Foundation, Inc., MidMichigan, the Maria M. Mencia Cancer Caregiver Support Network and Cancer Services that will provide a support system to caregivers for loved ones suffering from cancer. Lou Mencia of Midland helped launch the program in 2009 in memory of his late wife, Maria. Grant funding expands the service in several counties served by MidMichigan Health.


Who We Are

- Medical centers in Midland, Alma, Clare and Gladwin, with urgent care centers, home care, nursing homes, physicians, medical offices and other services.
- Provides care through more than 500 associated physicians and advance practice providers.
- Known for advanced technologies, quality facilities and campuses enhanced by generous local foundations and donors.
- Employs more than 4,684 people who together earn more than \$300 million in annual wages and benefits.
- MidMichigan Home Care serves patients in their residences with nursing, therapies, hospice, home medical equipment, home infusion, specialty services and more throughout 12 counties. Last year, 9,520 patients received services, including more than 500 hospice patients.

Earlier this year, Janet Griffith of Houghton Lake was clearing a little snow from her porch when she began having a heart attack. Despite suffering the most serious type of attack — an ST elevation myocardial infarction, or STEMI — Griffith's heart had minimal damage thanks to quick action taken by Houghton Lake EMS and MidMichigan Medical Center—Midland.

Enabling Students To Experience Clinical Care

Students from the region who are enrolled in the Physician Assistant Program at Central Michigan University have been gaining valuable on-the-job experience with physicians and staff at MidMichigan Health. Physician Assistant students complete clinical rotations in family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, psychiatry, emergency medicine and a final rotation of the student's choosing. Each five-week-long rotation is capped off by testing and a presentation by the student. Last year 17 second-year students completed a total of 43 five-week clinical rotations with providers associated with MidMichigan Health. Additionally, 10 first-year students completed mentorship placements with MidMichigan as they explored their areas of interest in health care.

Bike Helmets Protect Young Heads

MidMichigan Health has donated and fitted more than 700 bicycle helmets to children around the region this past year. MidMichigan Medical Center-Midland's Adult Trauma Program gave away more than 250 children's bike helmets during a Great Lakes Loons game this summer. In addition to distributing helmets, Injury Prevention and Trauma Outreach Coordinator Kelli Jankens supervised a team of Medical Center volunteers who spent time fitting each helmet and educating parents and children on the importance of always wearing a helmet, even on short rides. When used properly, bike helmets are proven to be 85 to 88 percent effective in preventing head and brain injuries.

What Are MidMichigan's Technology Highlights?

MidMichigan Health has some of the latest and most advanced technologies in the state, so patients don't need to travel long distances for state-of-the-art care. Surgical and treatment technologies include cardiac catheterization using the Siemens Axiom Artis FC imaging system, da Vinci® robotic surgery, Gamma Knife® surgery, deep brain stimulation, image guided radiation therapy using RapidArc® technology, MammoSite® brachytherapy, the Velocity® 3-D mapping system for electrophysiology procedures, Silverhawk™ plaque excision, and stereotactic breast biopsy and vagal nerve stimulation. Advanced imaging technologies include capsule endoscopy, digital mammography, ImageChecker® for mammography, magnetic resonance imaging, (including 3.0 Tesla fixed MRI and 1.0 Tesla Open MRI), PET scanning and ultrafast CT.

MidMichigan Health showed improved operating performance during fiscal 2013, and its financial condition remains very strong. This strength results from the underlying conservative principles we use to manage our balance sheet. These principles include:


- Strong Liquidity: We have over \$450 million in investments at June 30, 2013, or the equivalent of approximately 331 Days Cash On Hand.
- Investment in Facilities and
 Technology: Over the past few years,
 we invested approximately \$122 million
 in the Harlow Expansion Project
 (resulting in state-of-the-art operating
 rooms and private patient rooms) and
 acute and ambulatory electronic medical
 records (EMRs). In fiscal 2013 we received
 "Stimulus Funds"/ "Meaningful Use"
 Funds of \$9.1 million and expect to
 receive a total of approximately \$23
 million over a five-year period.
- Net Revenue Reserves: We continue to be appropriately conservative in how we record net patient care revenue and maintain appropriate reserves for changes in estimates with respect to billing and third-party payor audits.
- Conservative Funding of Our Pension Plan: For the last several years, we have continued to fund our pension plan in excess of our requirements. In fiscal 2013 the discount rate has positively impacted our Plan and our balance sheet. Our Plan is funded at approximately 100% on a PPA basis.
- Strong Capital Structure: Our debt-to-capitalization ratio of 27% as of June 30, 2013 continues to be lower than most organizations our size.

In Fiscal 2013, total operating revenue increased as a result of the growth in new providers (physicians, physician assistants and nurse practitioners) and the benefits from establishing a stronger clinical documentation program. Fiscal 2013 results included the following significant expense-related items:


- Ongoing expense related to the EMR: \$13.0 million (primarily depreciation, remote hosting contract service, software maintenance and labor)
- Impact of Employee Incentive Plan:
 \$4.0 million (compensation and related benefits) and
- Expenses related to the University of Michigan Health System affiliation:
 \$1.2 million (primarily consulting and legal fees)

Overall, MidMichigan Health reported Total Income of approximately \$24 million. As a not-for-profit, we reinvest our "Total Income" back into our communities to fund capital improvements, improve patient care, invest in our employees, and implement technology that will allow us to provide excellent health services to improve the quality of life for people in our communities.


